

## FROM OUR TEMPLE RABBI

## An Inauspicious Anniversary

One of the main themes of Passover is the journey me'avdut l'cherut — from slavery to freedom. The seder experience is a ritual re-enactment of the physical, emotional and spiritual transition and adaptation of the Israelites from a slave mentality to one of freedom. For the second time we celebrated Passover with family and friends via ZOOM. While a very different experience, we look forward to celebrating in person next year.



As vaccinations become more readily available, there is excitement and anticipation to resuming a pre-pandemic "normal life." Certainly all of us look forward to being able to safely worship together and have activities resume at the Temple. That WILL happen, but until it does each of us has an obligation to act responsibly as we move towards "herd immunity." I am not an immunologist (nor do I play one on TV) but common-sense dictates reasonable and cautious behavior on our part. Judaism demands that we protect ourselves as well as others from threats to our health and welfare. Even after being fully vaccinated, simple precautions like mask-wearing, maintaining social distancing and frequent hand-washing, can and do continue to help reduce the risks of infection and/or transmission.

The Israelites did not make the journey from slavery to freedom overnight; neither should we go from mandates and restrictions to pre-pandemic life from one day to the next. Regardless of our state's unrestricted reopening, commonsense, data-driven recommendations, and concern for our neighbors can and should guide our individual behavioral decisions. By doing so, we can work together to insure that we can be together that much sooner.

For most of us, a day, an hour, a minute doesn't pass when we don't think of loved ones who have gone from this world and are present to us only through the blessing of memory. Memory and grief are lonely journeys. The irony is that every one of us will make this journey; at one time or another, for one loved one or another. Jewish tradition's response to this lonely journey is to create opportunities for a "community of grief and memory" to come together throughout the year to remember and to bless. This is the purpose of YIZKOR. Four times during the year: Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Pesach (Passover) and Shavuot, we gather as a congregation of mourners. Those whose losses are more recent stand alongside those whose experiences are more remote. Together we support each other and remind one another that the light can and will return; that hope and blessing remain alive. Please join us for Yizkor Worship, Sunday, April 4th at 10:30 a.m. via Zoom. An e-mail will be sent with a link to join.



## FROM OUR TEMPLE PRESIDENT

#### LET ALL WHO ARE HUNGRY COME AND EAT

Kol dichfin yeitei v'yeichol—let all who are hungry, come and eat.

This year as in previous years we begin our Passover Seder by declaring: "This is the bread of affliction which our ancestors ate in the land of Egypt. Let all who are hungry come and eat; let all who are needy come and celebrate Passover with us. Now we are here; next year may we be in the Land of Israel. Now we are slaves; next year may we (and all people) be free."



So what do we really mean by this declaration? It turns out that throughout Jewish history, our teachers have interpreted this statement in different ways, allowing us to have a broader understanding of this invitation than we might initially have thought.

Are we actually throwing open our doors and inviting the world to our Seder table? This literal interpretation seems impractical for obvious reasons.

Therefore, some interpret this statement as an invitation that is not intended for outsiders. Instead we are inviting ourselves and the people around us to be completely immersed in the Seder. To put aside our own troubles and agenda and to experience the story we are about to recite in body and in mind. We are all hungry. We hunger for a greater knowledge of Judaism. We hunger to try to understand and feel the pain of slavery and persecution, followed by the joy of freedom and redemption. The agony and the ecstasy that our ancestors experienced not only in Egypt, but also throughout other ancient times, the middle ages, the early modern era, the pogroms, the Holocaust, and ongoing into the present. We are all needy. We are needy for spiritual guidance, for love, for kindness, for understanding and for human touch.

Others interpret this statement as a call to Tikkun Olam (repair the world) and Tzedakah (righteous acts). We ourselves are able to leave the bread of affliction behind as Passover ends, however,"963 million people around the world are unable to leave the affliction of hunger behind. Each day, 25,000 adults and children die from hunger and malnutrition. In fact, a child dies every six seconds because he or she is starving."-UN World Food Program. Therefore the statement, "Let all who are hungry come and eat," is really a call to action. It is our sacred duty as Jews to contribute to feeding the hungry. It does not matter whether we do this locally through organizations such as the SE Texas Food Bank, Some Other Place, or the local Catholic Charities. Or that we do this nationally or internationally through organizations like Mazon. It is only important that we contribute and do our part to end hunger.

These two above interpretations are not mutually exclusive, but are in actuality inclusive and complementary. They are both important, but for different reasons. So I will end with the following thought. Next year in Jerusalem, but if not in Jerusalem, at least back in our Sanctuary and Social Hall.

# UPDATE OF CDC GUIDELINES March 9, 2021

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has issued new guidance for vaccinated people, giving the green light to resume some pre-pandemic activities and relax precautions that have been in place.

Specifically, the new guidance at <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated-guidance.html">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated-guidance.html</a>, says people who are fully vaccinated can visit indoors with other fully vaccinated people without wearing masks or social distancing. People are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after they have gotten the second shot of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines (or two weeks after receiving the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine).

Vaccinated people can also visit, unmasked, with people from another household who are not yet vaccinated, as long as those people are at low risk of serious illness from the virus. However, the agency said, vaccinated people should continue to wear masks when they're in public, avoid crowds and take other precautions when gathering with unvaccinated people who are at high risk of serious illness from COVID-19.

The new guidance also allows fully vaccinated individuals to forgo testing and quarantining following a known COVID-19 exposure, as long as they are not experiencing symptoms.
