



FROM OUR TEMPLE RABBI

Below is a reprint of Rabbi Michaels' Annual report:

As we enter a new year, begin a new decade, and install new leadership, we have the opportunity to reflect, plan and dream. Congregations need time for self-reflection. No congregation should coast, go on auto-pilot, or think of its mission as the doing of business-as-usual. This is the time to celebrate our accomplishments; take a hard look at the challenges we face; examine realistic possibilities; but most importantly, it is creating/revising our congregational roadmap that directs our "sacred Jewish journey to enrich lives."



We began that process with our Town Hall Meeting earlier this month. About half of our congregational membership attended and shared their concerns, ideas of myriad areas. I am grateful to all who attended and shared their thoughts. I urge all of us to continue to do so through email or direct conversations with me and/or Wayne.

The demographic chart I shared was sobering. When we see that 81.2% of our membership is over the age of 60, we have to wonder: What will Temple Emanuel look like in 10 or 20 years? We began a visioning process that must include creating a type of congregational "will" that will outline our legacy desires. It is our sacred obligation to grapple with the ultimate (and uncomfortable) questions like: What will happen to all our assets (building, contents, Judaica, cash & endowments) when our congregation cannot be sustained through membership? How can we insure that our cemeteries will be appropriately cared for in the future? How might we create ways to guarantee a Jewish presence or historical record here in Beaumont and southeast Texas. That is not to say that Temple Emanuel is on the "critical care" list, but it would be irresponsible of us to ignore the demographic trends.

Becky (z"l) & Edwin (z"l) Gale and the Gale Foundation have been extremely generous to our congregation and our community. As beneficiaries of their generosity, are we utilizing those funds in ways that reflect their ideals and our core values? Let me share with you some of many ideas that were shared at the Town Hall meeting:

- -Creating an additional cemetery endowment for perpetual care
- -Making our facilities more ADA accessible
- -Creating a community fund that functions in the name of Temple Emanuel
- -Developing more cultural/educational opportunities

-More outreach in the community; revamping the Love Thy Neighbor Program (including a reallocation of funds raised to go back into the Beaumont community)

- -Dues restructuring as more of our population ages and is on fixed income
- -Outreach to Lake Charles Jewish community
- -Shared use of facilities in order to maximize use and lower costs/revenue stream or possible relocation to west side of town

Let me reiterate that this is a PROCESS. It doesn't happen overnight or all at once. As our tradition teaches:

Lo alecha ham'lachah ligmor – It is not up to us to finish/complete the task;

V'lo atah ben chorin l'hibateil mimenah – But neither are we free to desist from it.

I look forward to working with everyone in this visioning process as we take the next steps forward in Temple Emanuel's Sacred Jewish Journey to Enrich Lives.


FROM OUR TEMPLE PRESIDENT

Excerpts from my remarks at the Annual Congregational Dinner 2020

Teshuvah, Tefillah, Tzedakah

I have been asked what I see as the theme of my next 2 years as Temple President. What do I see going forward? The following are a few of my thoughts:

We are the face and the voice of Judaism in SE Texas. Along with this role comes tremendous responsibility. So what can all of us at Temple Emanuel do to fulfill this responsibility? Our Rosh Hashanah prayers literally tell us what we need to do.



On Rosh Hashanah it is written, on Yom Kippur it is sealed ...but Teshuvah, Tefillah, Tzedakah temper judgment's severe decree.

The Hebrew word Teshuvah is often translated as repentance, however, this translation is not actually correct, the correct literal translation is "to return," which signifies a return to the original state. So what is this original state? It is a state where there is no hate, no fear, no xenophobia, no grudges, and no revenge. There is only love, kindness, respect, patience, forgiveness, acceptance and inclusivity. This is the lesson that our Torah tries to teach us again and again. Let's start with love. We often talk about our, "Love Thy Neighbor," initiative, however, action always speaks louder than words. I can honestly say that I truly love everyone in this room tonight and everyone else in our congregation. You are all absolutely part of my extended family. So first and foremost we need to strive to express and show our love to each other. Because when you approach one another with love, then kindness, respect, and acceptance follow. Equally important is that when you love one another you are more capable of forgiveness and acceptance. Being able to forgive each other for our transgressions, either overt or covert, real or imagined, is the essence of what our Torah teaches us. You cannot change the past, but you can control and shape the present and the future, and is it not the present and the future that are truly important as opposed to the past? A negative or unpleasant interaction with someone may be a life lesson, but should not be a life sentence. Let me repeat that, a negative or unpleasant interaction with someone may be a life lesson, but should not be a life sentence. I challenge everyone reading these words to make a concerted effort to forgive all those who you think may have wronged you, and to do so whether you think they deserve it or not. The time has come to just let it go, and if not now, when?

One way to avoid unnecessary conflict altogether is to always ask ourselves 3 questions before we speak: Number 1. Is it truthful? Number 2. Is it necessary? Number 3. Is it kind? Let me repeat these questions: is it truthful, is it necessary, and is it kind? If the answer to any of these questions is no, then maybe it should be just left unspoken.

Acceptance is also a large part of Teshuvah. When we love and forgive others and they love and forgive us, then it is much easier to accept them for who and what they are despite any perceived shortcomings. We cannot ask God to accept and forgive us for who and what we are, and to overlook our own shortcomings, unless we are willing to do so with those around us. One of our core values states, "We are committed to being an inclusive community open to everyone who wishes to join us for worship and study." Love, forgiveness and acceptance are how we put this core value into practice so it does not become just words on a page. Let us focus on what unites us, rather than on what divides us.

Teshuvah, Tefillah, Tzedakah temper judgment's severe decree.

The Hebrew word Tefillah is often translated as "to pray," however, the Hebrew root actually means "to think, entreat, judge, intercede," and the reflexive means "to judge oneself." One of our core values state, "We are committed to meaningful, relevant and engaging worship." Authentic Jewish prayer requires one to take a long, hard and honest look at oneself in the shadow of God's Presence, where nothing can be hidden or

denied. We have to ask ourselves the following. Have I been living up to my potential? Have I properly used the gifts God has given me? Are there things that should be more important to me or less important to me? Through sincere self-examination we will hopefully be able to discern between that which we want and that which we need, and truly have our priorities in order as we stand before God.

When we make requests to God we often ask for health, wisdom, peace, wealth, et cetera. Our job is to soul-search, and to know the right reasons for wanting these blessings. We ask for health, not just because we don't like pain or doctors, but because if we are in good health, we are better able to serve God and to serve others. We ask for wisdom, not because we want to impress people with our high IQs, but because the greater our wisdom, the deeper our understanding of the knowledge of God, then the greater our ability is to accomplish Tikkum Olam, repairing the world. We ask for wealth not for material possessions, but because to those who much is given, much is expected. Having wealth allows us to accomplish many righteous acts. I can think of no better examples of this concept than our own Edwin (z"l) and Becky (z"l) Gale and the Gale Foundation, who have done so much to this point and whose legacy will continue to do so much going forward to accomplish Tikkum Olam, by repairing the world for years to come. This now brings us to the subject of Tzedakah.

Teshuvah, Tefillah, Tzedakah temper judgment's severe decree.

The Hebrew word Tzedakah is often translated to mean charity. However, in the Torah, Tzedakah means "righteous behavior" and is often paired with "justice." In Jewish thought and tradition, material support for those in need is not a matter of "charity"—a term that implies generosity beyond what may be expected—but an absolute requirement. As in most areas of life, here too Jewish tradition makes practical demands and specifies expectations. The <u>rabbis</u> of classical Judaism praised Tzedakah, calling it, "equal in value to **all** the other <u>mitzvot</u> (commandments), combined." Let me repeat that, Tzedakah is felt to be, "equal in value to **all** the other <u>mitzvot</u> combined." They also praised those who practice Tzedakah, saying that they are able to attain a level of extreme holiness.

When we give donations to our Temple, whether in the form of dues or other contributions, we should do so regardless of whether our Temple needs the money or not. We should do this because it is Tzedakah, a righteous act and a sacred offering. When we donate to our Social Justice Committee projects, to our, "Love Thy Neighbor" initiative, to The Julie Rogers "Gift of Life," to Mazor, to the SE Texas Food Bank, to Catholic Charities, to Some Other Place, among others, we should do so because it is Tzedakah, a righteous act. Again, we need to emulate the examples of Tzedakah set forth for us by our own Edwin (z"l) and Becky (z"l) Gale.

Tzedakah, can also be accomplished by giving of our time and labor as well, such as working on the maintenance of our sanctuary, buildings, and cemeteries, or volunteering at Some Other Place. There are many ways to accomplish Tzedakah. Any and all truly righteous acts are forms of Tzedakah. Tzedakah is a pathway to accomplish Tikkum Olam, Tzedakah is a pathway to, "Love Thy Neighbor." Tzedakah is, "equal in value to all the other <u>mitzvot</u> combined."

I would therefore like to summarize the theme of my Presidency as follows: **Teshuvah - Forgiveness and Acceptance**, **Tefillah - Meaningful Worship**, **Tzedakah - Righteous Acts**.

Some specific things that I would like to try initiate and/or accomplish during my tenure include:

- Doing everything in my power to ensure we continue to have Rabbinic Leadership for our services, including Shabbat Services, Torah Study, High Holy Day Services, Second Night Seder, Purim and Sukkot, as well as our other Jewish Holidays and Life Cycle Events.
- With the approval of the Temple Emanuel Board of Trustees: Establish the, "Edwin (z"l) and Becky (z"l)
 Gale Temple Emanuel, Love Thy Neighbor Fund," for the purpose of Tzedakah, to give back to our
 Community.

• With the approval of the Temple Emanuel Board of Trustees: Establish the, "Hebrew Rest and Kol Israel Cemeteries Endowment Trust," for the purpose of long term perpetual care of our cemeteries.

- Do necessary and preventive maintenance, upgrades, and repairs of our aging facility and cemeteries.
- Work on updating the existing "Temple Emanuel Endowment Trust" and "Temple Emanuel By-laws" to reflect the realities of 2020 and our current demographics.
- Begin the drafting of a "Living Will" for our congregation as part of long term planning.

We may be small, but I believe that by working diligently together, we can harness tremendous power and potential to accomplish great things for our congregation and for our community.

2019 Annual Report of the Temple Emanuel Social Justice Committee (TESJ)

The 2019 TESJ Menu of Projects offered flexibility, spirituality and audacious hospitality, the key ingredients of President Chef-Cheryl's term. Each TESJ project was reported in detail in monthly Temple bulletins and is summarized below:

- Throughout 2019: Provided transportation or cards or calls as part of Caring Community;
- Throughout 2019: Encouraged donations to Social Justice Fund, benefiting Beaumont and Beyond;
- Throughout 2019: Encouraged participation in community/church events via Save the Dates in the Temple Bulletin, Shabbat Program, and eblasts;
- December 2018 February 2019: Collected 35 bath towels and 46 blankets of all sizes for Women & Children's Shelter of Family Services of Southeast Texas and presented same to representatives of Family Services and The Shelter at Shabbat Services in February 2019;
- February March: Fertilized and added mulch to The Orchard and removed broken sidewalks;
- March: Shared \$250 with Lay Leader in Africom for the purchase of Kosher for Passover cheese for Jewish soldiers serving far from home. Lay Leader arranged for KP cheese to be purchased in France, transported on a military plane, then distributed to Jewish soldiers serving in Africom;
- March April: Collected donations and/or food/water and/or socks for the fulfillment of 200 You are a Blessing Bags for Homeless neighbors of Temple Emanuel and beyond, including 40 shared with the Veterans served by the VA. Fulfilling Blessing Bags is always an intergenerational project;
- May: Conducted a creative <u>intergenerational</u> Social Justice Shabbat, blessed the Sacred Sages of Temple Emanuel, remembered Holocaust victims and victims of terrorism, including the 11 who died at Tree of Life Synagogue (Pittsburgh, PA), and enjoyed a special O'neg Shabbat;
- August: Coordinated Temple Emanuel's participation in the 17th Annual Tasting for Some Other Place with the serving of homemade noodle kugels:
- September October: Conducted our Annual High Holiday Food Drive benefiting the clients of Southeast Texas Food Bank.
 Congregants and Friends of Temple Emanuel donated 426 pounds of food/water and \$474 in cash/checks. Pounds equated to 355 meals; dollars equated to 1,896 meals; total number of meals made a difference to 2,251 people! In addition, congregants were encouraged to donate to MAZON and to provide toiletries to Henry's Place of Some Other Place;
- September November: Shared mitzvah Disaster Relief dollars as follows: \$500 to Team Rubicon and \$500 to IsraAid in support of their boots on the ground in the Bahamas post-Michael; and \$1,000 to Temple Emanuel to be shared confidentially with Congregants/Staff affected by Imelda;
- November: Sent \$250 to Jewish National Fund for Israel:
- December: Shared \$250 with Jewish Family Services of Houston benefiting Holocaust survivors; PLUS, served Christmas Lunch to 177 clients of Some Other Place and distributed Meals-on-Wheels to another 209 clients! During this TESJ <u>intergenerational</u> project at SOP, we worked in partnership with many Friends of Some Other Place. A total of 66 volunteers, including 22 from Temple Emanuel/Friends of Temple Emanuel, served hot holiday meals to 386 people!

Please give us your thoughts, observations, concerns and suggestions you may have for or about the Cemeteries.

A project that remains pending is conducting a physical Census of both Cemeteries to add accurate information for mapping and visual displays that can be kept and regularly updated on the Temple Computer, as well as the Ledgers and Maps of the Cemeteries.

To be sure we have accurate information, it would help if those that have relatives, friends or know persons buried in the cemeteries would provide us the particulars of such persons, including their names and dates of birth and death.

Our thanks to Jane Kaulfus for her continuing effort to keep track of recent burials.

Another project being considered is cleaning and clearing underbrush and debris from the woods and along the boundary borders of Hebrew Rest Cemetery. Over time underbrush grows and accumulates in the woods and along the borders of Hebrew Rest Cemetery, and debris and dumping of cuttings has occurred. Removing and disposing of this will require labor and equipment over and beyond that for contracted ordinary grounds-keeping. If at all possible, this should be done before the spring rains and growing season returns. Labor and possible equipment rental are being researched.

In the past, we have been fortunate to have dedicated congregants and benefactors who have helped and supported the Cemeteries. I take this opportunity to thank each of them; they are a true blessing to our community.
