



#### FROM OUR TEMPLE RABBI

#### "ADDING MEANING TO VIRTUAL SERVICES"

This year is particularly challenging as we prepare for the High Holy Days. The COVID-19 pandemic has altered most every aspect of our lives to be sure. The Hebrew month of Elul is traditionally dedicated to composing a type of "individual needs assessment" or "spiritual inventory". This year, in addition to a spiritual self-assessment, we are faced with creating a physical environment within our homes that will be



most conducive for the spiritual and emotional experience of the High Holy Days.

Tradition tells us that the home is a *mikdash m'aat* – a miniature sanctuary. The challenge this year with "virtual services" is: how can we best replicate the experiences we each have when we gather together in our beautiful and inspiring sanctuary? As your rabbi, I am working hard with Angela, Dwight and our Ritual Committee to ensure a sense of continuity. But regardless of what we do to maintain consistency, it will not be the same. Let's face it, not being physically together, greeting one another with a hug and a warm "*shanah tovah*" just isn't the same. But with that said, allow me to share a few suggestions that might help make the "virtual" High Holy Days a little more high and holy:

- Plan to have a "yuntef" meal. Whatever the menu, lighting candles & reciting Kiddush and motzi set the mood.
- Get dressed for services. Even though you're at home, "changing" for services can have an impact on your spiritual experience.
- If you normally wear a kipa and/or talit, continue to do so.
- Create a "sacred space" in your home where you are not distracted and can focus on the spiritual tasks-at-hand.

If you know how to "cast" the services to your TV from your device (computer, tablet or phone), do so. It will free up your hands and you

might be more engaged as you focus on the prayerbook. (Google "Casting to my TV" for instructions)

• Finally, remember what these days are all about and focus on what's most important - *chesbon ha-nefesh* an individual spiritual accounting of the soul.



#### FROM OUR TEMPLE PRESIDENT

In Ongoing Pursuit Of: **Teshuvah-**Forgiveness and Acceptance, **Tefillah-**Meaningful Worship, **Tzedakah-**Righteous Acts

#### Tikkun Middot - Repairing of Our Attributes

During the month of Elul we have a month long spiritual challenge to improve ourselves in preparation for our High Holy Days. The process is called Tikkun



Middot, "repair our attributes." Middot literally means measures or weights, but in this instance it is felt to mean character traits or attributes. Some of these character traits are often defined as follows: 1. *Hitlamdut* – Openness to Learning. 2. *Behira* Points – Choice Points. 3. *Anavah* – Humility. 4. *Savlanut Ka'as* – Patience. 5. *Chesed* – Loving kindness. 6. *Kavod* – Dignity, Respect, Honor. 7. *Shtikah- Shmirat HaLashon* – Silence and Mindful Speech. 8. *Bitachon* – Trust in God. 9. *Emunah* – Trustworthiness. 10. *Seder* – Order.

Hitlandut — Openness to Learning. This includes not just being open to and pursuing the continuous learning of Torah, but also to taking the time to learn about ourselves, about others, and about our world in general. We need to look inward to understand why we ourselves act the way we do and also to look outward to try and understand why those around us react the way they do. We need to try to understand what they are going through and try to empathize. At the same time we need to also attempt to understand why things are occurring in the world around us although often there are no easy answers to these questions. Lastly, I believe that the pursuit of all knowledge and ongoing self-education is in itself a blessing.

Behira\_Points – Choice Points. Every day we are faced with a multitude of choices. Some of these choices are inconsequential and others can have a major impact on ourselves and others. If we frequently make bad choices, we need to understand why. We also need to understand the implication of these choices. Once we are aarmed with this knowledge, we can then strive to make better choices in the future.

Anavah – Humility. In the English language, humility is usually associated with meekness. However, this is not the case in Hebrew. The Torah describes Moses—the preeminent leader, the one who confronts Pharaoh and even God—as "the most humble (anav) of people." In the Musar tradition, humility (anavah) is understood as self-esteem, a midpoint between arrogance and self-deprecation. This can be a difficult balancing act. In all our human interactions we need to strive to not project superiority, while at the same time not displaying a sense of weakness and inferiority.

Savlanut Ka'as – Patience. Savlanut literally means to bear the burden of another—or one's own burden. It is not so much about the actual situation that may be causing our frustration, as much as it is about how we react to that situation. Instead of responding in anger, we need to take a step back and give the source of our irritation the benefit of the doubt. I was recently very irritated when I needed to be somewhere and was caught in a traffic jam on I-10. I later discovered that the source of this was a horrendous traffic accident with fatalities. I felt so very ashamed at my reaction. I thought to myself what I should have done was shown patience and counted my own blessings. We often cannot control the situation, but we can control how we respond to it.

Chesed – Loving kindness. We read in the Book of Psalms (89:3): "The world is built through chesed (loving kindness)." We are taught that God created the world in order to share God's goodness with all of creation. Thus, the ultimate purpose of our lives is to act with chesed, to do what we can to make this world a better place, Tikkun Olam. Any act of kindness, no matter how small, such as greeting others with a smile, contributes to Tikkun Olam. This concept is at the very core of our Temple's Social Justice and Love Thy Neighbor initiatives.

Kavod – Dignity, Respect, Honor. Each human being is created in God's divine image. We are all holy! Kadosh kadosh kadosh Adonai Tzeva'ot, melo kol ha'aretz kevodo, we recite in the Kedushah prayer. Therefore, if we understand and remember that as we gaze upon another human being, that we are actually seeing the face of God, then it becomes easier to treat others with dignity, respect, and honor. Another way to think about this is to treat others the way you yourself would want to be treated.

Shtikah- Shmirat HaLashon — Silence and Mindful Speech. Words either spoken or written are one of the most powerful forces on Earth. Words can help to heal others and words can gravely and irreversibly wound and damage others. So very dangerous are thoughtless and intentionally harmful speech to relationships and communities that the rabbis equated Lashon Hara - "harmful speech" to the three most grievous sins: idol worship, murder and incest. - Maimonides, Hilchot De'ot/Laws of Character Development 7:4. I have discussed this previously, but feel it needs to be reiterated. Before we speak we should ask ourselves three questions in regards to what we are about to say: 1. Is it truthful? 2. Is it kind? 3. Is it necessary? If the answer to any of these questions are no, then silence may prove to be the holiest action and response.

Bitachon – Trust. The root batach literally means to lean or rest on someone or something. Batach b' means "to trust in", or more specifically to trust in God, when used by the Bible. Bitachon means consciously placing the burden or one's concerns and worries on God and trusting that things will work out. It is not an attitude based on experience, but one that creates experience. It says, "Things will be good because I believe they are good." Your belief does not create good, the good is already there. Your belief provides the means by which that good is allowed to rise to the surface.

*Emunah* – Trustworthiness. "Emunah is usually translated as 'Faith' but also means 'Trustworthiness.' While Bitachon is a more general sense of trust in God and/or someone or something beyond ourselves, Emunah is the trust we create through acting with integrity. The quality of *Emunah*/Trustworthiness means keeping your word, meaning what you say, saying what you mean, and honoring your commitments. Acting in these ways allows others to see that they can rely and depend on you, and it encourages them to behave accordingly. It forms the basic foundation of a well-functioning relationship, community and society.

Seder – Order. The Hebrew word Seder literally means "Order." The word is widely known because of the Passover Seder, named thus because it is such a highly-structured ritual meal. To be capable of all the other Middot we must have order in our lives. We must be able to prioritize. Those who attempt to accomplish too much often end up accomplishing nothing. An overloaded electrical socket is often in danger of catching on fire. Sometimes we have to say no to taking on additional commitments, if they will jeopardize the commitments we have already promised to do. Or, in order to take on the new commitment we have to delegate a prior commitment to someone willing and able to complete the task in a similar manner. In short we must have the appropriate order in our lives to effectively accomplish our goals.

Although trying to accomplish all of the above Middot may seem like a daunting task, any incremental improvement in our personal character is much better than none at all.
