



Hopefully, the mood and the messages of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur will remain with us as we celebrate Sukkot and Simchat Torah. Will the impact of these holy days continue to inspire and guide us throughout the year? Michael Josephson, who is mostly known for his radio commentaries entitled "Character Counts," wrote the poem below. His words speak eloquently to the values, Jewish values, we should strive to live by and which, we as parents, have the



responsibility to instill in our children. I share this piece with you in the hopes that you will reflect on its meaning to you personally, and how its message might help to shape our personal priorities. The poem is titled: What Will Matter



For most of us, a day, an hour, a minute doesn't pass when we don't think of loved ones who have gone from this world and are present to us only through the blessing of memory. Memory and grief are lonely journeys. The irony is that every one of us will make this journey; at one time or another, for one loved one or another. Jewish tradition's response to this lonely journey is to create opportunities for a "community of grief and memory" to come together throughout the year to remember and to bless. This is the purpose of YIZKOR. Four times during the year: Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Pesach (Passover) and Shavuot, we gather as a congregation of mourners. Those whose losses are more recent stand alongside those whose experiences are more remote. Together we support each other and remind one another that the light can and will return; that hope and blessing remain alive. The Meaning of High Holy Days for the Hebrew Year 5781



Our Torah says:

And the Lord spoke to Moses, saying,

Speak to the children of Israel, saying: In the seventh month, on the first of the month, it shall be a Sabbath for you, a remembrance of Israel through the shofar blast, a holy occasion.

You shall not perform any work of labor,

And you shall offer up a fire offering to the Lord.

And the Lord spoke to Moses, saying:

But on the tenth of this seventh month, it is a day of atonement, it shall be a holy occasion for you; you shall afflict yourselves, and you shall offer up a fire offering to the Lord.

You shall not perform any work on that very day, for it is a day of atonement, for you to gain atonement before the Lord, your God. - Leviticus 23:23-28

Rosh Hashanah, literally means "the head of the year." The ancient rabbis believed this day to be the anniversary of the day on which the world was created. In our prayers, we often call it **Yom Hadin** (Day of Judgement) since this is the day when God re-evaluates all of His creations and determines their fate for the year ahead.

The Hebrew word for "year" ("Shana") comes from the word for "change" ("Shinui"). Therefore, a year is considered as a cycle of changes we go through. When we decide that we need to change—that our current self-aimed and individualistic approach to life needs realignment to one guided by connections, love and bestowal—then it is considered as the beginning of the new year: <u>Rosh Hashanah</u>, the beginning of change.

We then start judging ourselves. We are used to judging our *actions*, but what we really need to judge are our *intentions*, especially in relation to people.

This is done partly by deeply examining the questions, "What do I really intend for other people?" and "Where am I in relation to the qualities of connection, love and bestowal?"

It is customary to translate 'Yom Kippur' as the 'Day of Atonement.'

The initial Hebrew meaning of the root 'K-P-R' {כ־פֿר־ס} - which 'Yom Kippur' comes from – actually means 'to cover' and can be found in the original Hebrew name for the 'Mercy Seat' of the 'Ark of the Covenant' which is called in the Hebrew Scriptures 'Kaporet'). {כפֿררת) ('covering').

The concept of 'covering' in Biblical Hebrew can also be understood in an abstract way as 'covering sins' – meaning 'to grant atonement.'

Both of these Hebrew terms ('Yom Kippur' and 'Kapporet') are strongly connected and not just grammatically. The Ark of the Covenant was placed in the holiest place in the Temple – the 'Holy of Holies' which was strictly forbidden to enter EXCEPT by the High Priest and only on the holiest day in the Jewish calendar – 'Yom Kippur.'

According to tradition, the first Yom Kippur took place after the Israelites' exodus from Egypt and arrival at Mount Sinai, where God gave Moses the Ten Commandments. Descending from the mountain, Moses caught his people worshipping a golden calf and shattered the sacred tablets in anger. Because the Israelites atoned for their idolatry, God forgave their sins and offered Moses a second set of tablets.

On both Rush Hashanah and Yom Kippur we recite the Unetaneh Tokef prior to the Kedushah prayer. The following re-interpretation of the Unetaneh Tokef is from Rabbi <u>Joseph Meszler</u>, I believe that this re-interpretation at least in part gives us some answers to the questions that I posed earlier.

"I offer this prayer for us all at the time of the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah, and the Jewish Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur.

On Rosh Hashanah it is written, on Yom Kippur it is sealed:

That this year people will live and die, some more gently than others and nothing lives forever.

But amidst overwhelming forces of nature and humankind, we still write our own Book of Life, and our actions are the words in it, and the stages of our lives are the chapters, and nothing goes unrecorded, ever.

Every deed counts. Everything you do matters.

And we never know what act or word will leave an impression or tip the scale.

So, if not now, then when?

For the things we can change, there is t'shuvah, realignment,

For the things we cannot change, there is t'filah, prayer,

For the help we can give, there is tzedakah, justice.

Together, let us write a beautiful Book of Life for the Holy One to read."

To this I wish to add my own personal additional prayer.

Blessed is the Lord our God, ruler of the universe. Lord I ask you to grant the following to all of our congregation, their families, our community, our country, and to everyone:

Grant Love and Kindness, with the ability to truly love one another and to be kind to one another despite our differences, religious, ethnic, racial, political or otherwise.

Grant Peace, with the ability to sincerely forgive each other, for all transgressions whether they are real, perceived, imagined, or otherwise. I pray to you, Lord for peace, understanding, and healing among all people everywhere.

Grant Serenity, with the ability to remain calm in the face of adversity.

Grant Joy, with the ability to be happy despite current or future circumstances, be they good, bad, or indifferent.

Grant Hope, with hope for today, hope for tomorrow, and hope for the future.

Our Father, our King, accept my prayers with mercy and with favor. Amen
