

FROM OUR TEMPLE RABBI

Chanuklaas 5782

Saint Nicholas, good holy man!
Put on your Tabard, the best you can,
Go, therewith, to Amsterdam,
From Amsterdam to Spain,
Where apples bright of Orange,
And likewise those granate surnam'd
Roll through the streets,
all free and unclaim'd



This holiday nursery rhyme was one of the many Sinterklaas poems I grew up with, I celebrated Chanukah with my family, even though Sinterklaas in my family was better known as Chanuklaas, or the Chanukah Man, who on occasion came by our homes during those rare years when Chanukah and Sinterklaas coincided, which was not very often.

The English translation above came from a pamphlet that John Pintard released in New York in 1810. It is the earliest source mentioning Spain in connection to Sinterklaas. Pintard wanted St. Nicholas to become patron saint of New York and hoped to establish a Sinterklaas tradition in New Amsterdam. If he had been successful, perhaps the Big Apple would have been known as the "Big Orange!" Apparently he received help from the Dutch community in New York, which provided him with the original Dutch Sinterklaas poem. Strictly speaking, the poem does not state that Sinterklaas comes from Spain, but that he needs to go to Spain to pick up the oranges and pomegranates. So the link between Sinterklaas and Spain goes through the oranges, (also the official name of the Dutch royal household, and another name for the The Netherlands itself (Oranje) perhaps an explanation why your rabbi likes the vibrant colour orange so much, even though that might be a tad Freudian)

Originally, the Sinterklaasfeest celebrates the name day, 6 December, of Saint Nicholas (270–343), patron saint of children. Saint Nicholas was a Greek bishop of Myra in present-day Turkey. In 1087, half of his relics were furtively transported to Bari, in southeastern Italy; for this reason, he is also known as Nikolaos di Bari (then a Spanish city). In this tradition St. Nicholas comes from Spain and has a black assistant depicted as a Morisco page boy known as Zwarte Piet (Black Pete).

Because of the help he gave to sailors in his home town, Saint Nicolas was venerated as the patron saint of sailors, which is why he comes to the Netherlands by steamboat. His anonymous gifts and kindness towards children had already secured him the patronage of children, by the elders of Lycia, his home province. The holiday was both an occasion to help the poor, by putting money in their shoes which evolved into putting presents in children's shoes.

The modern tradition of Sinterklaas as a children's holiday was likely confirmed with the illustrated children's book *Sint Nicolaas en zijn knecht* ('Saint Nicholas and his servant'), written in 1850 by the teacher Jan Schenkman (1806–1863). Some say he introduced the images of Sinterklaas' delivering presents by chimney, riding over the roofs of houses on a dappled mare, and arriving from Spain by steamboat.

Zwarte Piet (Black Pete) is Sinterklaas' much beloved helper of the absent-minded and gullible Sint and today, of course, the source of a huge conversation on race in the Netherlands – should Black Pete turn into a colourful Pete, red, green, purple?

There are various explanations of the origins of the helpers, one is that Saint Nicolas liberated an Ethiopian slave boy called 'Piter' (from Saint Peter) from a Myra market, and the boy was so grateful he decided to stay with Saint Nicolas as an assistant.

My hope for this Chanukah and holiday season for our entire community is the understanding that the true miracle of Chanukah is not found in the story of the cruse of oil, but rather that we have a lovely community that wants to continue to safeguard Progressive Reform Judaism for the generation of tomorrow.

May your homes and hearts be filled with light of the Chanukkiah and hope for the future of Progressive Judaism at Temple Emanuel and worldwide.



A few months ago Susan and I went to see a college football game with some very close friends. Five days later one of these very close friends was critically ill and in an intensive care unit fighting for his life. I was extremely shaken up when I heard this news. One of the things I thought about was how quickly life can change and I thought about the song by Don Henley whose chorus is quoted above.

Proverbs 27-1 states: "Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring forth." It is from this scripture that the following phrase originates, "Tomorrow is not promised." However, most of us go through life not thinking or worrying about a potential sudden catastrophic change that might happen to us, or to our loved ones. This approach is the correct one, since it is not healthy for us to live our lives in fear of what if.

However, I believe it is healthy for us to periodically embark upon self-reflection. To achieve self-reflection, requires us to ask of ourselves some difficult questions. Some examples of these types of questions are as follows:

- 1. Am I taking anything for granted?
- 2. Am I putting enough effort into my relationships?
- 3. Am I taking care of myself physically?
- 4. Am I letting matters that are out of my control stress me out?
- 5. What am I really afraid of?
- 6. Am I holding on to something I need to let go of?
- 7. If not now, then when?
- 8. What matters most to me in my life?
- 9. What do I need to change about myself?
- 10. Is it more important to love or be loved?
- 11. Which is worse: failing or never trying?
- 12. Are the majority of my decisions selfish or selfless?
- 13. What's the one thing I'd like others to remember about me at the end of my life?
- 14. Does it really matter what others think about me?
- 15. If I had only one more day to live, how would I spend that day?
- 16. Am I fulfilling the Mizvah (blessing) of Tzedaka (righteous acts) to the best of my ability?
- 17. Am I truly practicing Tikkun Olam (helping to repair the world)?
- 18. What is my true relationship with God?

TEMPLE EMANUEL COVID-19 GUIDELINES As of October 20, 2021

CONGREGATION TEMPLE EMANUEL—BEAUMONT, TEXAS

TITLE: Unrestricted Opening of Temple Buildings and Sanctuary

APPROVAL DATE: COVID-19 TASK FORCE: July 5, 2021; BOARD OF TRUSTEES: July 21, 2021; October 20, 2021

RECOMMENDATION FROM COVID-19 TASK FORCE: The COVID-19 Task Force met July 5, 2021 at 7:15 pm via Zoom. Members present; Wayne Margolis, M.D., Ken Parker, Bob Kramer, M.D., Cheryl Barenberg and Rabbi Chava Koster (via telephone). Members absent none. The following policy recommendations were approved by the Task Force and will be forwarded to the Board of Trustees for approval and implementation.

Temple Emanuel Administrative Building, Sanctuary and Swerdlow-Roosth Social Hall will adhere to the following guidelines as outlined by CDC as of May 28, 2021 and Local/State Health Departments.

Fully vaccinated congregants, Rabbi, employees, visitors and vendors may resume pre-pandemic activities offered by/at Temple Emanuel. You will not need to wear a mask or socially distance yourself from others. You are considered fully vaccinated if you meet one of the following conditions:

2 weeks after their second dose in a 2-dose series, such as the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or

2 weeks after a single-dose vaccine, such as Johnson & Johnson's Janssen vaccine

NOTE: individuals will not be required to show proof of vaccination. Individuals will only be asked if fully vaccinated. If they reply yes individuals will be taken at their word. If they reply no, those individuals will be strongly encouraged to follow quidelines outlined below.

Congregants, Rabbi, employees, visitors, and vendors who don't meet these requirements, regardless of age are not considered fully vaccinated. Congregation Temple Emanuel recommends that these individuals continue taking all precautions including but not limited to:

Wearing a mask

If you are not fully vaccinated and aged 2 or older, you should wear a mask while indoors at Congregation Temple Emanuel buildings.

In general, you do not need to wear a mask in outdoor settings while attending a Congregation Temple Emanuel function outdoors. However, in areas with higher COVID-19 cases, you may consider wearing a mask in crowded outdoor settings and for activities with close contact with others who are not fully vaccinated.

If you are fully vaccinated and have a condition or are taking medications that can weaken your immune system, you may need to keep taking steps to protect yourself. Those precautions may include but are not limited to:

Social Distancing-staying 6 feet away from others-Continue to social distancing measures and allow 6 feet between you and other individuals.

Handwashing-Frequently wash your hands to reduce exposure to COVID-19 Virus and emerging variants.

Coughing/Sneezing-Cough/Sneeze into handkerchief or elbow of arm.

Avoid crowds and poorly ventilated spaces

Get vaccinated

However, if the incidence of COVID-19 unexpectedly rises or variants of concern emerge, as determined by the World Health Organization, Center for Disease Control or Local/State Health Department guidelines, Congregation Temple Emanuel may recommend that Congregants, Rabbi, employees, visitors and vendors return to previously adhered to mitigations guidelines.

Additional Measures:

Motzi and Kiddush: Motzi will be recited in the Swerdlow-Roosth Social Hall immediately following Shabbat Services. Individual slices of pre-packaged challah will be available for those individuals who want to participate in the reciting of the blessing.

Kiddush will be recited following Motzi. Small individual glasses of kosher wine will be available for those individuals who want to participate in the reciting of the Kiddush blessing.

These guidelines defined above pertaining to Motzi and Kiddush may be changed at any point with approval of the Board of Trustees.

Please dispose of your individual package wrappers and individual Kiddush cups in appropriate trash receptacle.

At this point in time Congregation Temple Emanuel will not be having any buffet meals following Shabbat services. The standard Oneg, described above, will follow services and consist of blessings over challah and wine. This however may change with approval from the Board of Trustees.
